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**EL MUSEO DEL BARRIO PRESENTS 'DREAMING UP NORTH'  
A CELEBRATION OF IMMIGRATION**

*Throughout the month of September, the Museum will host an exhibition about migrant children, complemented by a panel discussion and a family day*

**NEW YORK, NY, AUGUST 21, 2017**—As part of its month-long celebration of migrant communities, El Museo del Barrio, in collaboration with *Colectiva Infancias* and a network of social anthropologists and photographers, present *Dreaming Up North: Children on the Move Across the Americas*, a temporary exhibition in our Cuéntame Gallery (behind Visitor Services Area) of materials highlighting the testimonies and experience of immigrant children. The installation aims to highlight the migrant children experience, in order to foster opportunities to understand this transnational phenomenon through their own voices and memories. On view from September 3 to 30, this month-long installation will be complemented with a panel discussion on September 9th, and our popular family day, Super Sábado, which will celebrate immigration on September 16th.

*Dreaming up North: Children on the Move Across the Americas* is an exhibition revolving around testimonies (in graphic, oral and written form) of immigrant children moving across the Americas. Collected by a team of six anthropologists and three photographers, each working separately, the exhibition depicts migrant children from Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, and Nicaragua. *Dreaming up North* draws upon interviews and workshops developed in humanitarian shelters, detention centers and transit areas within children's hometowns and their new homes in the United States. Themes include: Mexico's internal child migration and repatriation, transnational child migration from as far as Ecuador, the daily lives of migrant children in the US, and children's future migration plans.
