NEW YORK, NY, July 20, 2020 – Launching El Museo del Barrio's yearlong initiative *ESTAMOS BIEN – LA TRIENAL 20/21*, the museum announces *Obituaries of The American Dream*, a two-part participatory project by New York based artist Lizania Cruz. Commissioned by El Museo as the first of a series of online artists' projects, *Obituaries of The American Dream* considers how the ideal's roots in individualism and hard work pertains to U.S. society today, especially in the context of a pandemic. Using a fully accessible, digital platform, the artist invites participants, locally and globally, non-im/migrants and im/migrants, to share testimonies of when and how the American Dream died for them. These obituaries will be posted daily on the dedicated <u>website</u>, with contributions later printed in a publicly distributed newspaper in New York City next year.

Describing her project, Cruz explains "For me, the American Dream had terminal cancer but died of Covid-19 complications. It was through the pandemic that I realized the failure of our current value on work and individualism. I knew the system wasn't created for a person like me but, somehow, I believed the idea that through my hard work and my exceptionalism I could make it through. As we were all forced to pause I could see clearly that I was wrong."

The American Dream is defined as the ideal that all individuals can achieve upward mobility based on their hard work. As stated by James Truslow Adams in his 1931 book *The Epic America* "all [individuals] should have access to this opportunity according to ability or achievement." This ideal has proliferated globally and is rooted in the aspiration of individual wealth instead of community wellbeing. *Obituaries of The American Dream* aims to not only to grieve an ideal

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but to reimagine the role of work, interdependency, and government welfare in the creation of a new ideal. Thus, the second part of the project scheduled for spring 2021, will consist of a live stream idea-thon that will invite im/migrants and non-im/migrants share ideas with field professionals in order to co-write a collective new ideal.

ABOUT LIZANIA CRUZ

Lizania Cruz is a Dominican participatory artist, designer, and curator interested in how migration affects ways of being & belonging. Through research, oral history, and audience participation, she creates projects that highlight a pluralistic narrative on migration. Cruz has been an artist-in-residence and fellow at the Laundromat Project Create Change (2018-2019), Agora Collective Berlin (2018), Design Trust for Public Space (2018), Recess Session (2019), IdeasCity:New Museum (2019), Stoneleaf Retreat (2019), Robert Blackburn Workshop Studio Immersion Project (SIP)(2019), and A.I.R. Gallery (2020). Her work has been exhibited at the Arlington Arts Center, BronxArtSpace, Project for Empty Space, ArtCenter South Florida, Jenkins Johnson Project Space, The August Wilson Center, Sharjah's First Design Biennale, and Untitled, Art Miami among others. Furthermore, her artworks and installations have been featured in Hyperallergic, Fuse News, KQED arts, and *The New York Times*.

ESTAMOS BIEN: LA TRIENAL 20/21 is El Museo del Barrio's first national large-scale survey of Latinx contemporary art featuring more than 40 artists from across the United States and Puerto Rico. Curated by El Museo del Barrio's Chief Curator Rodrigo Moura and Curator Susanna V. Temkin, with New York-based artist Elia Alba as Guest Curator, the yearlong initiative launches with online projects (July 23 - October 15,

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2020) and culminates with an onsite exhibition (March 13 – August 22, 2021). The full list of artists will be announced in October 2020.
